STILLMAN FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT REPORT FOR COMPLIANCE WITH DECENNIAL COMMITTEE ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT EFFICIENCY ACT

I. Introduction

The Stillman Fire Protection District (SFPD) has a long history of protecting the lives and property of the fire district located in the northern part of Illinois in Ogle and Winnebago Counties. The fire district is made up primarily of single-family residential living that cover both the town of Stillman Valley and a large rural setting. The SFPD was established in 1952 and covers 62 square miles. The SFPD is responsible for providing services that include fire suppression, paramedic emergency medical services, rescue services, fire safety education and training. The fire district uses Ogle County 911 to dispatch and for emergency communication.

The SFPD is led by a board of five trustees that are elected by the citizens of the district. The Fire Chief, who serves at the pleasure of the board of trustees, oversees the day-to-day operations of the district. The organizational structure of the department is made up of the Fire Chief, a Deputy Chief, two Captains, five Lieutenants, firefighters and an administrative assistant.

VII. Recommendations for Increased Accountability and Efficiency

A. Strengths & Efficiencies

- Submission of individual and regional grant applications increases revenue potential for the district
- Full time paramedic staffed ambulance service with passage of referendum two years ago greatly decreasing response times
- Departments first OSHA audit with no issues or negative findings
- FIT testing and medical physicals annually
- District pays for EAP program for all members
- Fire Prevention and Public Service- Fire Prevention Week visit to all schools, open house at fire station, candy scramble, blood drive, CPR classes, vital checks in station, high school scholarship from fire department, address signs for residents, emergency drills district wide, medical stand-by at athletic events
- Department family events- annual banquet/awards ceremony, Christmas party for all members, department picnics
- Annual review of Fire Chief
- Ground Emergency Medical Transportation- since 2023 the department receives supplemental payments for Medicaid patients
- Chief Hoefle currently is VP of the Illinois Fire Chiefs Association. He speaks locally, state wide and nationally giving our department great exposure along with many networking and personal connections
- Training- SOP's/SOG's reviewed annually, officer training program, Target Solutions computer based training, ESO for NIFIRS and EMS reports, preplans
- Great working relationships with neighboring fire departments, police agencies, public works, county township, and school district
- Memorandum of understanding/agreement with school district for audio visual which saves cost to the district
- <u>Using Rockford Fire Department shop to save on costs on maintenance and down time of apparatus</u>
- Member of the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System provides the SFPD with access to more manpower and equipment
- Have had many SFPD personnel move on to full time larger departments which reflects positive on our department
- Back-up generator that provides an effective safeguard that allows the department to fully function during an electrical outage
- Annual pump and ladder testing from approved agency

B. Inefficiencies identified by the committee

- Not only locally but nationally recruitment and retention
- Neighboring departments are extremely short staffed. We frequently respond into other districts to assist with calls
- Limited funding for training, personnel, technology, and operations

C. Conclusion

During each of the three meetings, the SFPD Decennial Committee allowed for a public comment period and at the conclusion of each meeting the committee offered surveys to the public members in attendance to seek additional input and comments. There were no public in attendance at either meetings.

The districts revenue comes primarily from property taxes. Other revenues come from ambulance billing, donations, fund raisers and grants.

The Stillman Fire Protection District is committed to being transparent, efficient, and accountable to the taxpayers of the fire district. The fire district will continue to always evaluate our current services and look for new and better methods to provide excellent service to our community.
